1. SYNOD SLATES JANUARY MEETING: The Synod of Lakes and Prairies will hold its annual meeting Sunday evening through Tuesday morning, Jan. 17-19, at Mount Olivet Conference and Retreat Center, Farmington, Minn. Orientation meetings are planned for first-time commissioners and youth advisory delegates from 4 to 5 p.m. opening day. Synod Executive Phil Brown, in his memo to commissioners, wrote, "As we enter this New Year, I encourage each of us to consider the glimpse we have had of the Babe in Bethlehem. And so for the meeting of the synod assembly ... our time together in 2010 will call on us to seek a fresh glimpse for ourselves." The complete text of Brown's memo is on the [synod's website](#). 2. TWIN CITIES AREA ENDORSES JIN KIM FOR MODERATOR:

The Rev. Jin S. Kim (left), founding pastor of [Church of All Nations](#) in Minneapolis, was unanimously endorsed June 9 by

the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area to stand for moderator of the upcoming 219th General Assembly. The Assembly will be held July 3-10 in Minneapolis. Kim joins Elder Cynthia Bolbach of National Capital Presbytery (see story below) as candidates for the top elected post in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The winner will succeed the Rev. Bruce Reyes-Chow of San Francisco, moderator of the 218th General Assembly. Kim, 41, was born in Korea and came to the United States with his family in 1975, grew up in a multi-ethnic environment in Columbia, S.C. and Atlanta. He holds degrees from Georgia Tech, Princeton Theological Seminary and Columbia Theological Seminary. Kim wrote about the moderator position on [his blog](#). 3. COM/CPM LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE SLATED IN JANUARY:

Joseph Small, director of theology worship and education ministries for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), will be the keynote speaker for the Synod of Lakes and Prairies 2010 COM/CPM Leadership Conference slated Tuesday through Thursday, Jan. 26-28, at Christ the King Retreat Center in Buffalo, Minn. The theme for this year's conference is "Finding Joy in Our Vocations." Small, who has served in his position with the General Assembly Mission Council since 2007, holds degrees from Brown University, Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, Princeton Theological Seminary and Louisville Theological Seminary. He has served on the staff of Pittsburgh Theological Seminary and as pastor of churches in Towson, Md., Westerville, Ohio, and Rochester, N.Y. The conference's plenary presentations include "Authoritative Interpretation and Scruples," by Diana Barber, the synod's associate executive for leadership development, and "Leadership for a Multicultural Church," by Jin S. Kim,

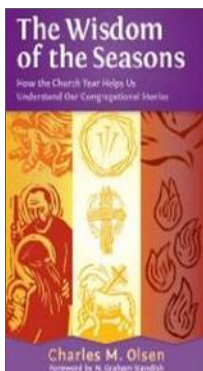

KWANZAA, UM COLLABORATE TO FIGHT PROSTITUTION: As a result of the high rate of prostitution in the community, Kwanzaa Community Church and researcher Lauren Martin of the University of Minnesota are collaborating to improve the lives of those engaged in trading sex on Minneapolis' north side. Together, they have developed the Northside Women's Space,

whose aim is to provide women in prostitution a space to connect with one another, based on the values of empowerment, respect, dignity, integrity, community and hope. 5. WINTER PASTORS' SCHOOL SET AT HASTINGS FEB. 1-4: The [2010 Winter Pastors' School](#), with the theme "When Church Stories Become Songs," runs Feb. 1-4 at Hastings (Neb.) College. 6. COLA PICKS COMMUNION WARE FOR GA'S OPENING WORSHIP:

The executive committee of the Committee on Local Arrangements for the 219th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), slated July 3-10 in Minneapolis, has selected the communion ware for opening worship Sunday, July 4. Diane Millner of [Stockholm Pottery](#) of Stockholm, Wis., a potter who has created hand-thrown functional stoneware for more than 25 years, was named artist of the communion ware. She will produce 450 chalices and 225 patens (plates) which will be available for

purchase as collector's items after being used to serve communion to the estimated 8,000 attendees at opening worship. According to the Rev. Paula Sanders, executive coordinator for the Committee on Local Arrangements, the committee chose this artist and her pottery based on her style which illustrates the General Assembly theme, "Rivers of Living Water." 8. 29 FROM NORTHERN WATERS GO TO TEXAS, EAU CLAIRE MEMBER BLOGS: Twenty-nine people from the Presbytery of Northern Waters, including six members of First Presbyterian Church in Eau Claire, Wis., are volunteering with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance in Port Neches, Texas, this week. Anyway, what I've really learned today is that the people I'm here with are the nicest around. It's good to know that I have people who will watch my back."

9. CARROLL UNIVERSITY STUDENTS MAKE CIVIL RIGHTS TRIP: The Rev. Bill Humphreys, chaplain at [Carroll University](#), Waukesha, Wis., along with about a dozen students and staff at the university, made a "civil rights pilgrimage" through the south Jan. 4-13. On Jan. 4 Humphreys wrote, "I get what feels like an extension on the holiday break as I head out this evening with about a dozen students and staff from Carroll, to join with a few more than that from Cardinal Stritch University, Milwaukee, Wis., for a Civil Rights (bus) Pilgrimage." The trip included stops in Atlanta; Montgomery, Selma and Birmingham, Ala.; and Memphis, Tenn. IOWA CHURCH HELPS WARM STUDENTS: Through an interesting set of twists and turns, the congregation of Monroe Presbyterian Church, Monroe, Iowa, learned that six in 10 students at Mitchellville (Iowa) Elementary School receive free and reduced-price lunches. When Mitchellville Elementary Principal Joe Nelson sent out a notice in school last fall, asking if any child needed outerwear for the season, the response indicated a substantial need. 14. BOLBACH ENDORSED FOR MODERATOR BY NATIONAL CAPITAL: National Capital

Presbytery has unanimously endorsed the first candidate to stand for moderator of the 219th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The assembly will be held



July 3-10 in Minneapolis. Elder Cynthia Bolbach, 61, (left) is a lawyer and member of First Presbyterian Church in Arlington, Va. "I feel called to stand for Moderator to help our church, proud inheritor of the Reformed tradition, discern how best to proclaim the timeless Gospel message to a 21st century world that is multicultural and religiously pluralistic," Bolbach said in a presbytery press release. She has leadership experience in many levels of the church. Bolbach served as co-moderator of the GA Form of Government Task Force. The task force first reported to the 218th GA in 2008 and will report to this year's Assembly when its proposal was referred back for more study and refinement. 15. PNS REVEALS 2 OVERTURES THAT WILL BE TRACKED THROUGH GA: Seven months from today, on July 11, the 219th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) will have concluded in Minneapolis. But, in a sense, the commissioners' work in Minneapolis will simply have been prologue to the work ahead of them in their home presbyteries. Part of this work will include presenting the overtures passed at the assembly that require presbyteries' approval for potential ratification.
