### 1. LOCAL PLANNING FOR 219TH GA CONTINUES:

Planning for the 219th General Assembly continues to gain momentum in the twin cities. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) meets July 3-10 at the Minneapolis

Convention Center and at least 8,000 people are expected to attend some part of the assembly. The presbyteries of Northern Waters and Minnesota Valleys are joining the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area as hosts. The Rev. ### 4. SYNOD COMMITS FUNDS TO HAITI WATER EFFORT:

The Synod of Lakes and Prairies committed the balance of accumulated receipts from the Peacemaking Offering, minus funds received from the 2009 offering, to [clean water projects](#) of the Synod of Living Waters and Synod of the Sun for the Haiti earthquake recovery efforts. **5. SYNOD TOLD THAT RACISM STILL EXISTS, GROWING:** Racism still exists and data show that racism's indicators are appearing more frequently. "Hate crimes and hate groups are still around," said Rowzat Shipchandler (left), racial equity manager with [The Saint Paul Foundation](#), pointing out that the number of "hate groups" in the United States has risen 54

## 6. SYNOD MOVES IN NEW DIRECTION REGARDING DAKOTA PRESBYTERY:

## 7. SYNOD'S SDOP APPROVES GRANTS

**TOTALING \$30,500:** The Synod of Lakes and Prairies' Self Development of People Committee reported that it approved \$30,500 in two grants when it met last fall. **8. SYNOD CREM GRANTS \$15,500 IN SCHOLARSHIPS:** The Synod of Lakes and Prairies' Committee on Racial Ethnic Ministry granted \$15,500 in scholarships to 12 students for the 2009-10 academic year. Elona Street-Stewart, synod associate for racial ethnic ministries and community empowerment, presented the report for the committee during the synod's winter meeting last week in Farmington, Minn. More than half of the funds went to students studying at seminaries, including Louisville, Dubuque, United and Luther. In addition, the committee distributed a total of \$2,000 in institutional awards to tribal colleges within the "boundaries of the synod and Cook College." ([Return to top](#))

WEE KIRK SET IN MAY IN SOUTH DAKOTA:** The Great Plains Wee Kirk Conference, "Little Flock, the Lord Delights in You," is on tap Tuesday through Thursday, May 4-6, at the Holiday Inn Sioux Falls, S.D., City Centre. According to the conference brochure, the purpose of the conference is "to inspire, equip, motivate, encourage and provide rest and refreshment" for pastors, commissioned lay pastors and leaders of small Presbyterian congregations. **11. KEATON WRITES OF 'MAKING CHANGES:'** Kevin Keaton, executive presbyter in the Presbytery of the Missouri River Valley, suffered a broken hip during the Christmas holiday. He wrote about "making changes" in the Jan. 25 edition of Monday Morning in the Presbytery, the presbytery's newsletter. He wrote, "It is not a tremendous revelation that each of us has to adjust and make changes in life. Suffice it to say, with a broken hip, I quickly have learned how to navigate through the day in an entirely different manner. In the church, we constantly are confronted by events that call for change. Weather causes postponement of a meeting. Declining membership forces reduction in programs and the budget. These changes require what Ron Heifetz labels as "technical" solutions. In today's current environment, however, what is more often required is an "adaptive" change: solving problems in a totally different manner. Congregational leaders would do well to view and discuss an interview with Ron Heifetz conducted by Faith and Leadership. He opened, "It started out as a loud rumble, as if a semi truck were driving next to our building. Then came the shaking: solid concrete rippling like water under our feet and all around us. As we looked at one another in pure shock, students across the walkway screamed - and suddenly we were running in a great mass, scampering down the stairs, seeking the safety of the courtyard below."
