PWS MINI MISSION WHAT AN EXPERIENCE THOUGHTS FROM TWO PARTICIPANTS

What an interesting mini mission we had. I learned many things about the Native American culture and the way they do things that I did not know before. I learned that when we go to our Presbytery meetings, we shouldn't complain if we have to travel a few hours as they have to travel sometimes a few days to get to theirs. They have the same problems we do with poor attendance but theirs is mostly due to lack of funds and ours is from lack of enthusiasm and prioritizing in our busy schedules. I learned that they also have trouble finding leaders and the job keeps getting reshuffled among a few. But most of all I learned that our Native American brothers and sisters are friendly and generous and they are truly working on forgiveness of our forefathers. Are we doing the same?

Rather than give a blow by blow description of the trip, I thought perhaps I'd try to put a finger on my emotional perceptions during the trip. In Flandreau, we were just having PWS meetings, and most of the Native Americans we met, other than members of PWS, were employees of the hotel/casino in which we stayed. I know the image that some people may carry of Native Americans living on a Reservation is one clothed in a loin cloth and carrying a bow and quiver of arrows. I think that would be mostly young people, whose only exposure to the Native American Communities is in the old western movies.

The Native Americans we met there we just hard working people at their everyday job, just like every other American. They live in houses, shop at WALMART, drive cars, and go through life just as the rest of us do. There was no significant opportunity to spend time finding out who they are or how they feel.

When we arrived at the Agency Village in Sisseton, we knew we were on a reservation, but the buildings and houses wouldn't have indicated a particularly different place, except the College on the outskirts was noticeable for a distance. At the 4 corners of the maintenance building close to the road were mounted 4 drummers facing each other with long drumming sticks. We were told that when the wind blew, the sway of the sculptures actually looked like they were drumming. Of course we all had to hop out of our cars and take pictures and imagined the sound of drumming.

It was here that we really got opportunity to mingle with families. Since we were there for two days, we could develop a bit of a relationship. Meals were about the same kinds of food I would prepare in my own home, though I cheat on fry bread, not making it from scratch. I found a table with a family that was 3 generations. Grandpa was a retired Presbyterian Pastor, the son was currently a Presbyterian Pastor, and there were teenagers with the MP3 Players and ear plugs all at that same table. Over the 2 days, I met wives, aunts and uncles; extended family. This family was from Eagle Butte and in Sisseton for the Annual Mission Meeting.

I discovered a wonderful sense of humor, an abiding sense of family and community, and a rich connection to history. I wished I could bottle the system that turns MP3 bearing teenagers into respectful young people. Babies and tots were singing and dancing as a matter of course. The creative eye for art design was incredible. Babies and tots were singing and dancing as a matter of course; and I certainly wish we could bottle the system that made respectful young people out of teenagers with ear plugs. The food prepared was the same as I might serve a large group, but at home, I cheat on fry bread, and don't make it from scratch.

We attended meetings and listened to speakers. One such speaker was David Farmer, a 30 something single parent who had opportunity to ride his horse in the last annual Ride of the Dakota 38. This is a ride for healing and unity for 330 miles that begins Dec. 10th in Lower Brule, SD, and finishes up in Mankato, MN, on Dec. 26th. It commemorates the forced ride of Sioux men in Dec 1962, at the end of which 38 were hanged for what was called an uprising, but it was men protecting their land and families. This event has become cultural memory for the Sioux peoples. Their feeling is that history has been unjust.

We had opportunity to glean knowledge from older Indians and found that even as late as 1920s, Indian youth were taken from their families, forced into school and punished for thinking of their culture or speaking anything but English in an effort to make them "like us". I am grateful that we live now in a more enlightened, tolerant age. I'm not sure where, or how I have known, but I have always seemed to know the Custer wasn't a very nice person, that the US Calvary was guilty of mass murders, the US Government cheated the Native American Tribes out of their land, reneged on treaties, and allowed ruthless greedy people to liaise between the Indians and the Government, stealing most of the value of what the Indians did have. I can be sure that all non-native Americans are aware as well, but we can raise awareness by speaking out.

Cornerstone recently received a congratulatory letter from The Creative Ministries Offering Committee of Presbyterian Women in the Presbyterian Church (USA) announcing that the Dear Ones Child Care program had been awarded a grant for \$30,000. The Westminster Presbyterian Church here in Rapid City was instrumental in helping Dear Ones apply for the grant. When the grant application was submitted, it was not known if Cornerstone would be successful in purchasing the building currently housing our child care program. In typical Cornerstone style, we took a leap of faith and made an offer to purchase. In our ministry, we often see the need before God gives us the answer, but we are so blessed by having the best and only omnipotent business partner. With the help of this grant and funds from the city's Community Development Block Grant, the Dear Ones Child Care program and building is now officially a part of the Cornerstone Rescue Mission. The expense of child care is difficult for many families, and that is especially true for homeless families trying to get back on their feet. The parents need the assurance that the children are cared for while they pursue self-sufficiency; employment, permanent housing, or going back to school and working, too. Possibly more importantly, the children need the consistency of a safe environment. Their lives have seen more than their share of change and instability, and their parent's adversities have an effect on them. The Dear Ones Child Care program is earning their trust. They are discovering that the same wonderful staff will greet them daily and care for their needs. Both parents and children alike are beginning to experience the hope of a better future. Cornerstone Rescue Mission is very grateful for this blessing. A way to evaluate your past PW year. . .

As we evaluate the PW year, looking at what has been done, measuring its effectiveness and finding ways to improve helps us to plan for the new PW year. The following activity found in the *20 Tips to Help Presbyterian Women SOAR to Success* (Tip 9: Evaluate) presents one way to complete the evaluation.

- 1) On a sheet of paper, list the 10 to 12 most meaningful things your PW did this past year.
- 2) On a large chart, list the four parts of the PW Purpose.
 - ❖ Nurture our faith through prayer and Bible study.
 - ❖ Support the mission of the church worldwide.
 - ❖ Work for justice and peace.
 - ❖ Build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthens the Presbyterian Church (USA) and witnesses to the promise of God's kingdom.
- 3) Read each of the 10 to 12 things your PW did and list them under the matching area. Example: If you said, "Used the PW Bible Study," put a tally mark under Section A on your chart. Continue until all 10 or 12 are listed on the chart.
- 4) Questions to Ask:
 - ❖ Do you have a well-balanced program for the year?
 - ❖ Are there areas you need to emphasize for the next year?
 - ❖ What has worked well? What has not?

. . . and a way to plan for the new PW year

Another tool that may prove helpful in planning for the new PW year is the Vision Obstacles Direction (VOD) activity which was presented at the August PWSCT meeting.

- 1) Answer these VISION questions:
 - ❖ What is it that you want for your PWP?
 - ❖ What dreams do you have?
 - ❖ What do you want to accomplish?

The key is to focus only on what the dreams are and not get bogged down in "but we can't do that because. . ."

- 2) Answer these OBSTACLE questions:
 - ❖ If _____ is your vision then why aren't you there?
 - ❖ What is it that is stopping you from being there?

For each vision item, list the obstacles.

- 3) Answer DIRECTION questions:
 - ❖ Given your vision and the obstacles you have named, what are some directions you might go to begin to head toward your vision?

WHAT WORKS FOR YOU?

The Leadership Committee of the Synod Coordinating Team decided at the August SCT Meeting to put a small article in this "Leadership Edition" of the *SOWER* about "WHAT WORKS FOR US" in our *Presbyteries and Congregations for recruiting and training new leaders in Presbyterian Women*. We thought it would be helpful to get input from you about what has been successful in recruiting and training new PW leaders.

We would love to hear from you and are hoping to get lots of great ideas that might work for others in this effort to keep our PW's leadership exhilarating and effective as we work towards God's mission for us.

We recently learned from our Synod Coordinating Team (4 of which attended a CCT leadership event) that one of the things we need to stop doing is "stick someone in" or "just get anyone" to fill an office or leadership position in PW. When we do this we demean the importance of the position or the person who held the position. Instead, build them up and let them know this is an important part of the work we do in PW as the Lord's messengers, spreading God's love through the PW mission. When asking someone to take a position, ask them to prayerfully consider "their calling" and listen for God's Holy Spirit wanting to work through them with the time and talents they have been given.

I know of a PW where someone was "just stuck in" as a Treasurer and major problems arose before this person realized they did not have the experience or ability to fill this position.

Something that has worked well for us is to have the incoming officer and/or potential officer sit down with the previous officer and go over the tasks and responsibilities of the position. We even have a small manual for some positions explaining many of the details of certain projects/events of our PW. In this way the incoming or potential officer knows exactly what is expected of them. This also works well as training for new positions.

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Leading like Geese



At this time of year it's not uncommon to see geese flying across the evening sky and gathering on our lake. Watching them brought to mind a fascinating story that appeared in our local newspaper several years ago about geese and how they demonstrate leadership. . . leadership reminders that we can apply to our work with Presbyterian Women.

Tom Worsham, the author of the story, shares that there is good reason for geese to fly in a "V" formation. "Research has revealed that as each bird flaps its wings, it creates uplift for the bird immediately behind it. By flying in a 'V' formation, the whole flock adds at least 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone, and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front. When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into formation and another goose flies at the point position.

The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed. And finally, when a goose gets sick or wounded and falls out, two other geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay with the goose until it is either able to fly again or dies. Then they launch out on their own with another formation or catch up with the flock. Whoever was the first to call another person a 'silly goose' didn't know much about geese."

In as much as the story of the geese is not new, neither are the leadership lessons we learn from them. These are simple reminders that will help keep us on course. Consider these five observations.

- People who share a common direction and sense of community can go further and get where they are going quicker and easier because they are traveling on the thrust of each other. Work as a team.
- We accomplish more when we work together in unity.
- It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks.
- We need to make sure our honking from behind is encouraging, not something less than helpful.
- Stand by each other and lend a hand when needed.

I am "honking" encouragement for all you are doing through Presbyterian Women!

"Reaching Out to the Poorest of the Poor with God's Love" was the theme for the spring gathering of PW/PTCA April 9 at the Presbyterian Home at Boutwell's Landing in Oak Park Heights. The morning speaker was Pastor Heidi McGinness, Outreach Director of Christian Solidarity International's US affiliate. Her topic was "Walking Alongside One Another in Sudan". In the afternoon there was a panel discussion featuring Ruth Jones of No. Presbyterian Church, No. St. Paul and Tina Brown of First Presbyterian, Rochester. The topic was "Remember Niger and Haiti". These women had been on mission trips to these countries. We were pleased to find out that the Remember Niger Coalition, of which Ruth is a part, is one of the grant recipients for the 2011 Thank Offering. (See HORIZONS, July/August , p. 28) Sheets were collected for African hospitals, an ongoing project of our presbytery. The offering of \$1025 was given to the Barbara Tilton Scholarship Fund to aid women seminarians in our presbytery.

On June 11 the Coordinating Team met at Calvin Presbyterian Church, Long Lake, to plan the Fall Gathering, which will be held at Calvin Presbyterian on October 15. The theme will be "Faith Empowers Community: Serving Our Sisters in Christ". Our gathering co-chairs are working to secure a speaker from the Kwanzaa Presbyterian Church, North Minneapolis, to speak about a new project of theirs, the Northside Women's Space, which is a refuge for victims of prostitution. Minnesota Public Radio and the St. Paul PIONEER PRESS have done features on human trafficking, and they will try to get a speaker from one of those. The Peace and Justice Committee's emphasis this year is on homelessness and domestic abuse. Women attending the fall gathering will be asked to bring a purse with items women need, including a small New Testament.

Report of PW in the Presbytery of Milwaukee

The women of PW in the presbytery of Milwaukee held their Spring Gathering at Grace Presbyterian Church in Beaver Dam on Sat. April 9. This was a half day event serving a brunch and concluding by 12:30. The theme for the day was "Justice for All: Imprisonment and Justice". Women were introduced to the concept of Restorative Justice through a presentation by speaker, Nancy Franke. The offering of the day was donated through Nancy Franke to further the work of restorative justice within that community. Other events of the day included a sharing time at the tables following registration as the women were to sit with those from other congregations and share stories of their PW programming and mission activities. This was very well received and provided new suggestions to take back to the local PWs.

A tradition was begun in the Milwaukee PW several years ago of offering a short memorial service for the women who have passed on during the previous year. These women served the Lord faithfully, in the capacity of leadership, teaching, loving and caring. They all deserve to be remembered.

The 2012 Churchwide Gathering was promoted with a 'Gathering Fan' given to each attendee and a short skit presented by women of the Coordinating Team.

Plans are under way for the Fall Gathering which will be held at Kettle Moraine UPC in rural Hartland. This will be a full day Gathering with a speaker and workshops in the morning and a special presentation following lunch.

Following through with the justice theme, Cathy Mathei will speak to us on 'NOT in OUR Pews: An advocate's on Domestic Violence'. The offering of the day will go to the Women's Shelter in Waukesha.

During opening devotions, we will again be honoring 'Women of Distinction'. Each

PWC is encouraged to select one woman from its congregation who is outstanding in her life of faith and service to the church and the Christian calling. These women are then presented with a certificate and a PW pin.

Workshop offerings will be 'Sharing Ideas for Mission' led by mission coordinator Betty Dean, and 'Deepening Your Faith through Prayer' led by Chris Siler.

Following lunch a presentation will be given by Betty Dean, Helen McMasters, and Marilyn Stone sharing experiences and impressions from the Mini-mission Experience in SD in August. Each women is asked to bring a 8"x 8" square of solid colored fabric to be shared with our sisters on the Indian Reservation for use in their quilting endeavors. The women are also asked to bring empty pill bottles and other items for the Bread of Healing Clinics in Milwaukee.

The PWPCT continues to publish its newsletter, the Grapevine, four times per year. As per the Sower, information is passed on from other levels of PW as well as news which is happening with the women of PW in the Presbytery of Milwaukee. Articles include comments from the moderator, Book reading lists and reviews, Going Green, Mission suggestions, etc.

Frontera de Cristo is one of six border ministries of the **National Presbyterian Church of Mexico** partnering with **Presbyterian Church-USA**. Frontera de Cristo is centered in Agua Prieta, Sonora and Douglas, Arizona.

It strives to share and live the Good News of Jesus Christ through six ministries:

Church Development – working to start 2 new churches in Agua Prieta and Hermosillo, and nurturing continued growth of Lily of the Valley Presbyterian, Agua Prieta and First Presbyterian, Douglas AZ. Both Lily of the Valley and First, Douglas are multi-cultural churches.

Health ministry – For 15 years working to educate residents and provide screening and medical care to prevent cervical and breast cancers, control diabetes and high blood pressure, and improve dental hygiene.

Family Ministry – sharing the Gospel with unchurched people through weekly Bible school for 30 children, monthly marriage workshops, women's self-esteem workshops, parenting classes in the schools, emergency assistance, and pastoral counseling.

New Hope Community Center – educational, cultural and development activities for the larger community: aerobics, guitar, cake decorating, sewing and barbering.

Mission Education – building relationships across borders, provides immersion experiences for universities, leadership groups and schools. Promotes faithful responses to the immigration crisis.

Just Trade Center – works to help other groups set up farmer cooperatives in Mexico and Haiti.

The farmers own the business, earn more money than if they sold their coffee to a broker, and also are able to provide health insurance for their families and retirement benefits.

Migrant Resource Center – works to bring different groups together to help migrants, especially those recently deported. Provide food, clothes, basic medical care if needed. Document abuse of migrants; help victims of violent crimes pursue legal actions.

God Has a Mission. God Needs a Church

The Bible talks about people working, praying and worshipping together as the Body of Christ. Christ taught that his purpose is not to be served, but to serve. As the body of Christ, congregations are called to serve according to God will.

God has lots of work for congregations. God brings congregations into being because God has a mission in the world. God needs congregations to carry out that mission. Unfortunately, many congregations have lost sight of their reason for existence.

The Quad presbyteries (Prospect Hill, Missouri River Valley, Homestead and Central Nebraska) have contracted with the Center of Parish Development (www.missionalchurch.org) to take advantage of its theological and organizational systems, research and experience to help churches learn to discern and participate in God's mission more faithfully and effectively. The process is called "Journey of the People of God."

Each presbytery has several coach volunteers, pastors and lay leaders, who gather for study and practice at Calvin Crest Camp near Fremont, Nebraska, led by Ray Schulte of the Center. They then work with congregations, other than their own, to help those congregations through a three step process.

Discovering happens when local church coordinating teams design a local journey. They get organized and communicate with local leaders and their congregations.

Discerning happens when members get involved, sharing their personal visions of what their church might be and do. They spend time together in Bible study and then identify new perspectives.

With all that insight developed, the congregations can imagine a local vision, putting it in writing with a structure in light of a missional strategy. Innovations and concrete recommendations develop as they plan a transition into a new church design.

Some truths that often come to light are that in North America, Christian churches are changing. Intentional change is the result when we recognize that we are dissatisfied with the present. We need to face that and seek to understand it.

According to Ray, "It is more fearful for some churches to transform than it is to die." Let us go be the hands of Jesus.
