TOGETHER IN SERVICE – Let Your Light Shine

Sisters in Christ Jesus. Blessings to all of you for being the hands and feet of Christ in our world! The work you do is so important to your church, your community, the nation, and the world. Your Light shines bright because of your love, your kindness to others, and your willingness to give to those less fortunate than yourselves.

During this time before the P.W. of the Synod Triennial Gathering, your Together in Service team is asking you to extend yourselves once again and help us help those who need love, kindness, and nurturing.

Together in Service is having three hands-on workshops at the Gathering in June and encourage you to attend these workshops to get the work done.

The workshop for tying lap blankets is a mission for the community of Watertown. The lap blankets we complete will be given to the Jenkins Living Center, a skilled nursing facility. They have indicated that this would be a wonderful gift to their community.

The second workshop is sewing on pompoms on baby hats to be distributed to throughout our presbyteries. You can also bring any baby hats you have made, and we can always find a place for these.

The third workshop is putting together the Kids Kit school bags with bags and school supplies that you collect and donate. We are asking for completed bags and supplies from the following list. Please bring all donations to the Swan Room. This project will serve the need in the U.S. through Gift of the Hearts.

KIDS KIT (FORMERLY SCHOOL BAG KITS)

What was once the beloved School Kit has now become the Kids Kit—an updated, thoughtfully refreshed package to be used at home or in the classroom.

- One box of 12 colored pencils
- One 2-pocket folder
- One glue stick
- One pair of blunt scissors removed from the package (rounded tip, only)
- One 70-page spiral bound notebook (no loose-leaf or filler paper)
- One 30-centimeter/12" ruler
- One hand-held pencil sharpener removed from the package
- One large eraser (no pencil cap erasers)
- Six new, unsharpened pencils with erasers (removed from packaging and use a rubber band to hold the pencils together)
- One box of 24 crayons (only 24)
- One 12"x14" to 14"x17" finished size cotton or lightweight canvas bag with handles (solid color or kid-friendly fabric, no logos, reusable shopping bags or backpacks)
- Optional item: One handmade or store-bought pencil pouch. For instructions on how to make a pencil pouch go to Make Your Own Pencil Pouch - Sew Much Moor

All items must be packed inside of the bag.

Optional: Loose school kit items may be placed in a large Ziploc type bag to keep them together. Remove the air, seal the bag and place inside of the cotton/canvas bag.

Finally, the Swan Room will be open all day from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. so you can enjoy your creative side with rock painting. If you have never tried this, come and find out how much fun it can be. You do not have to be artistic, just want to have a good time and relax. All supplies you need will be provided.

If you are unable to attend the Gathering, please still consider donating school supplies as these are a much-needed staple for kids. Contact the Moderator of your Presbytery to see how to get these to the Gathering. God bless you for everything you do!

Baptizing America is one of the books we will be discussing at the Gathering!!



The Associated Church Press, the oldest interdenominational religious press association in the U.S., recently honored <u>Baptizing America</u> with its top award for nonfiction books published in 2024. The group also gave four awards to <u>Word&Way</u>, including two first place honors for <u>A Public Witness</u>.

The ACP emerged at a 1916 meeting of the Federal Council of Churches (the main forerunner to the National Council of Churches) in St. Louis, Missouri, as editors of various denominational publications decided they should start meeting together. Today, its members include the leading publications in mainline Protestant life as well as some Catholic and evangelical publications.

During the ACP annual convention in Chicago, Illinois, Brian Kaylor and Beau Underwood's book <u>Baptizing America: How Mainline Protestants Helped Build Christian Nationalism</u> won the Award of Excellence (the top honor) in the nonfiction books category. A judge wrote, "This is an important book for our time and the authors help make sense of a growing movement of Christian Nationalism and its effect on democracy." The award follows a <u>Best in Class in books</u> honor for <u>Baptizing America</u> from the Religion Communicators Council.

"These awards are encouraging because they show more and more people of faith are recognizing that Christian Nationalism is a rising threat to democracy and to the freedom of religion in the United States," said Brad Lyons, president and publisher of Chalice Press. "Baptizing America holds a mirror up to the mainline churches that dominated American culture for decades and helps us recognize the error of our ways — and how we need to change our ways and undo the damage that has been done. Baptizing America is a must-read for Christians who are allies for marginalized communities being hurt by Christian Nationalism." Word&Way e-newsletter A Public Witness.



With "Do Everything in Love" as the theme, we continued our gift basket silent auction with proceeds to Clearwater Forest Camp. Much of the day was spent celebrating the incredible work PW groups in the congregation are doing. Our Presbyterian Women in the Presbytery of Winnebago in the Synod of Lakes and Prairies are trying to rejuvenate our PWP. We have not gotten together for either a Spring or Fall Gathering for some time. We are asking all of our local PW groups and women in the churches without PWs for input. Would they like a Fall Gathering with a guest speaker, a get together with a bag lunch to enjoy the fellowship and share ideas, try a Zoom meeting or something else?

While contacting the PWs or churches via phone, email or paper letters, we have received favorable responses. Some are still collecting offerings, conducting Horizons Bible studies, book and/or knitting groups, mission sewing, organizing weekly family nights and buying school room supplies for a local elementary school. One group holds a bake sale and soup lunch since their church is a voting poll location. The money collected is used for mission purposes. Others offer help in their communities for physical, mental or spiritual needs.

Anti-human trafficking is a problem for our communities. Although people dismiss the concerns, what many do not realize is that this problem goes undetected and appears invisible. Presbyterian Women, volunteers from churches and other community organizations are working together to bring awareness and education to our communities. They are holding workshops and going out to hotels, restaurants, gas stations and other places of business to bring anti-human trafficking awareness materials to them and to educate the owners. Human trafficking affects the mental, physical and spiritual health of anyone involved.

There are a number of available positions on our PWP-CT. We are hoping for volunteers to fill those vacancies. A full roster would help the mental health of our coordinating team.




