Greetings from South Dakota, where things just keep getting weirder by the week. In February, the governor spoke to the combined Legislature claiming we must be prepared to send troops and material aid, such as razor wire, to Texas to fight the war at the border. She said South Dakota is now a border state because the cartels have moved into the reservations and are killing people and trafficking drugs using the rez as a base. Of course, the native tribes took exception to her rhetoric and the Oglala tribe has now banned her from the Pine Ridge Reservation.

Now more than ever we need to hear the words of Luella Voight and Julie Miller about their USAME trip to the border. They spoke and answered questions during the January Sit & Sip and it was the exact opposite of what we hear on the news. These women are willing and excited to share what they learned with as many people as possible. Please contact them to arrange for a visit to a presbytery or church event. The Together in Service Committee will highlight a mission which is embraced by the women of one of our churches in the Synod of Lakes and Prairies in each edition of the Sower. In this issue, we have chosen *Nexus Family Healing*, a mission supported by the P.W. of Westminster Presbyterian Church in Austin, MN.

Nexus Family Healing is a nonprofit, 501(C)(3) organization, headquartered in Plymouth, Minnesota.

Their mission is "Changing the course of a child's life by stabilizing families and strengthening mental health".

Their vision is "Healing the past. Breaking the cycle. Changing the future. In order to succeed in their mission they apply values which include innovation, compassion, agility, responsiveness, and excellence. These values are executed with synergy and grit.

They believe that "in changing one life it changes everything". With their innovative, customized approach, they provide outpatient therapy, residential treatment, and foster care to help children, families and individuals struggling with emotional and behavioral health issues. They create a customized plan for each child, family, and individual—and provide the exact combination of support services needed to put that plan into action. This innovative personalized approach helps heal trauma, break cycles of harm, and restore hope to families when all seems lost.

Over the last 50 years, Nexus has helped thousands of children, families, and individuals find individualized paths to emotional, mental, and behavioral health. What began in 1972 as a single program in Minnetonka, MN, has grown into a network of nine agencies in four states, Minnesota, North Dakota, Illinois, and Maryland. They are nationally recognized as a progressive leader in youth and family healing and are more committed than ever to continue their work.

DEVOTION from Rev. Dr. Bret Lamsma, "What Are You Giving Up For Lent?" Familyfire.com (2/15/2018)

I wanted to commit to something in my spiritual life that would lead to growth during the season of Lent. I was also pretty sure that giving up coffee or television wasn't what I needed, either as a commitment or as a way to draw me closer to God. Here are some of the ideas that I came up with.

Give up something distracting

• Giving something up and taking the time that you would have spent on that certain thing and spending it with God instead is more to the point. Instead of watching a certain TV show each day, spend that time reading the Bible. Rely on God through his word and prayer to help you give that certain thing up.

Add something that is missing

Maybe you have a desire to pray more or read the Bible more or even take one day a week and rest from work.
 Lent is an opportunity to add those things into your life that might be missing. It could be daily prayer time, or bible reading. It could be family devotions at the table instead of meals in front of the TV. Additions can have a deep impact on your daily walk with God.

Explore a characteristic of God

• I read Genesis 1:1 and realized that the first thing we learn about God in the Bible is that he is creative. I am not a creative person, and felt like I needed to learn more about our creative God. So I committed to doing one act of creativity each day. I learned so much about God and about who he created me to be during those 40 days of creativity.

Maybe you want to explore God's justice.

• Commit to doing an act of service or justice each day throughout Lent and see what God teaches you about his character. Explore God's characteristics as a family and look for ways that you can reflect his image to your community.

Participate together

 Talk together about how your family might give up a distraction or pick up a spiritual practice that helps your family to see Jesus more clearly this year. Maybe your family can spend time together each day to pray for the people in your life. Turn off the TV early and take time to read through one of the gospels during Lent to hear God's story together. There are lots of ways to get intentional about getting close to God.

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and sustain in me a willing spirit. Psalm 51:10,12

What <u>You Can Do</u> About Mental Illness By Sam Rainer, *Outreach* magazine (April 2022)

The church is well positioned to be a vital part of the solution to the problem of mental illness. The local church is the first place many people turn to when suffering from mental illness. What can you do? How can you lead your church?

- 1. **Remove the "Taboo" Label**--Silence often creates a perception that something is off-limits. Lead your church with language. The church should become the place where the shame of mental illness crumbles. Those affected by mental illness want their churches to speak more often about it. Mental illness does not signal a lack of faith any more than contracting cancer signals a lack of faith. Speak candidly and with compassion. When you address the issue out loud, many taboo perceptions go away.
- 2. **Understand the Warning Signs**--Since such a wide variety of mental illnesses exists, a comprehensive list of symptoms does not exist. However, there are <u>warning signs</u>. Take note of extreme mood changes on a regular basis. Any substance abuse is an indicator something is wrong. An inability to complete daily tasks, routines, and work are also warning signs.
- 3. Maintain a Trusted Network of Professionals--No pastor can do it all. No church leader is trained for every potential illness. The church staff should not attempt to handle every case. Some mental illnesses require help from people with proper training. Pastors and church leaders should have a list of professionals they trust for referrals. It's dangerous to believe you can deal with every type of mental illness. It's equally as dangerous to make referrals without knowing the professional.
- 4. **Create a Clear System of Reporting Procedures**—If someone starts discussing suicide, do your leaders know what to do? Is the staff aware of what hotlines to call if necessary? More than twice as many people die from suicide every year than by homicide. More women attempt suicide, but men are more likely to use deadlier methods. Everyone in your church should know it's judicious to call 911 if they believe someone is at risk.
- 5. **Recognize the Spiritual Struggle of Mental Illness**--The world is fallen. People are broken. While science has enabled us to understand better and treat mental illness, the suffering is ultimately rooted in a spiritual struggle. Quoting Scripture out of context or offering silly clichés ("It's simply God's will") does not help anyone. However, Scripture does demonstrate how we are to show compassion: pray, listen, comfort, and be willing to serve. One of the best ways churches can help is by filling in the gaps for hurting families: running errands, babysitting children, and providing meals. The Good Samaritan was willing to take on inconveniences to serve a hurting man. The church should do the same for those suffering from mental illness.
- 6. **Be Ready to Minister Long Term**--The problem of mental illness will not be solved with quick fixes. People who have mental illness could be in for a long-term battle. The church must be ready to walk with people for months, if not years. Not every church may have the ability to create an ongoing counseling ministry, but every church can do something. Group leaders can be trained on the warning signs of mental illness. Staff can be ready with a network of trusted professionals. And everyone can serve someone walking down the difficult road of mental illness. Unfortunately, too many feel as if they are walking alone. The least the church can do is come alongside someone and walk with them, however long that walk may be.

A Dozen Things **Your Congregation Can Do** in Mental Health Ministry

From Presbyterian Mission Agency (April 2021)

Don't go it alone—A ministry needs both champions and companions. Recruit two people who can support and encourage each other in initiating this ministry. Have them personally recruit others who may have interest in this area and consider inviting all who are interested to participate. It's often surprising to discover the gifts, perspectives, and experience present in our congregations.

Use the church newsletter—Include articles each month to promote the ministry and provide education on some form of mental illness or aspect of recovery. Articles from the ministry team and reflections on mental illness from the pastor on the front-page article can help raise awareness and dispel stigma.

Bring it into worship Have a 3-5 minute "Moment for Mental Health" in worship each month. Always in a manner that protects confidentiality, pray for those living with mental illness and their families in the pastoral prayer on a regular basis. In preaching, look for opportunities to discover how the scripture speaks to the lives of those living with mental illness and those who care for them.

Use social media—Members can repost these reflections to a broader audience. A weekly "Mental Health Monday" on the church Facebook page can be a good place to start. A dozen or more posts can be written at one time and submitted to the church's social media administrator to upload on a weekly basis.

Teach Sunday School courses—Annually lead 1-3 Sunday School courses of 4-8 weeks each on some aspect of mental illness. The field is broad, the congregation may well have professionals in the field willing to teach, and the topics will draw different demographics of the church.

Host NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) courses—NAMI will send trained teachers to lead Peer-to-Peer (for adults with a mental illness diagnosis), Family-to-Family (for family members of adults with a diagnosis), and Basics (for family members of a minor with a diagnosis) Courses at your church. Your church simply provides a good space for these 6-12-week courses to take place. www.NAMI.org

Observe May as Mental Health Awareness Month and the first week in October as Mental Illness Awareness Week—Find a variety of ways to educate about mental illness throughout May and October (NAMI is an excellent resource). Use the above means of communication and others for informing the congregation. Invite worshippers to wear a green ribbon or receive a "May-nicure" (painting one fingernail of each willing worshipper green to symbolize the 1 in 5 people living with a diagnosable mental illness in any given year).

Plan and lead a "Service of the Longest Night" on December 21st—The holidays can be a particularly difficult time of the year for those living with mental illness and their families. A solemn service that names their pain and yearning can be a helpful way of showing care during a season where they may feel disconnected from the joy being proclaimed.

Offer a Mental Health First Aid Course—This 8-hour course could be just for the pastor and members of the congregation or open to the larger community. It provides an excellent basic level of instruction in understanding mental illness and recognizing and responding to signs that someone may be considering taking their own life.

Participate in a NAMI Walk—These walks help raise funds for NAMI's annual budget and raise awareness of mental illness for the larger community. You might also meet people from other churches who are participating in the walk and can share ideas about their mental health ministry.

Create a display of NAMI brochures and information about local mental health services—Whether near the church office, in the narthex, or in a well-travelled hallway, a display with a variety of educational brochures from NAMI can be accessed by members and visitors alike throughout the week.

September is Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. #BeThe1To make a difference. Include information about the National Suicide Prevention 24/7 Lifeline in your display. 

Synopsis: Fierce, angry, funny, heartbreaking. . . *There There* is a relentlessly paced multigenerational story about violence and recovery, memory and identity, and the beauty and despair woven into the history of a nation and its people. It tells the story of twelve characters, each of whom have private reasons for traveling to the Big Oakland Powwow. Jacquie Red Feather is newly sober and trying to make it back to the family she left behind in shame. Dene Oxendene is pulling his life back together after his uncle's death and has come to work at the powwow to honor his uncle's memory. Opal Viola Victoria Bear Shield has come to watch her nephew Orvil, who has taught himself traditional Indian dance through YouTube videos and has come to the powwow to dance in public for the very first time. There will be glorious communion, and a spectacle of sacred tradition and pageantry. And there will be sacrifice, and heroism, and unspeakable loss.

Tommy Orange writes of the plight of the urban Native American, the Native American in the city, in a stunning novel that grapples with a complex and painful history, with an inheritance of beauty and profound spirituality, and with a plague of addiction, abuse, and suicide.

Gather the Children Home - Wakanyeja Gluwitayan Otipi (Emergency Foster Care) Pine Ridge Reservation, Porcupine, South Dakota



Gather the Children Home is a culturally appropriate emergency foster care home for children ages birth thru age 12. It provides a caring, immediate safe environment for children removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect, while a suitable foster or relative's home becomes available.

Items needed include: baby layettes, twin sheets and mattress pads, twin-sized tied-fleece blankets, crib sheets, towels and wash cloths. Also, ongoing financial support paying for monthly internet and phone expense or some other monthly expense.

Iglutecha (ee-gloo-teh-chah) – a Lakota word meaning "to renew yourself" PO Box 5005, Pine Ridge, SD 57770

Iglutheca, a 501(c)3 organization in Pine Ridge, SD, has as its mission to provide a pathway for homeless Lakota people out of addiction and poverty. Iglutheca offers the basics of meals, safety, sleep, showers, and community. It also provides case planning and management tailored to each person's needs, which includes:

addressing addiction, mental health, spiritual support, health care, housing, income and assistance obtaining vital documents. Meeting basic needs is a huge advantage as it enables individuals to plan for their next steps. Items needed are: men's black or grey crew socks, men's underwear size med thru XLg, women's socks and underwear, coffee (not specialty), baking mixes (cookie, cake and brownie), paper/styrofoam bowls/plates, plastic forks/spoons, and 33 gallon trash bags.

College Scholarship for Native Students Sisseton Wahpeton College, Sisseton, SD

Red Cloud Renewable (RCR) helps address the severe housing crisis on the Pine Ridge Reservation with the construction of affordable, sustainable (cellular concrete), energy efficient, culturally compatible "dome homes" built by Native workers. RCR, through the Lakota Thiyuha Project, provides the workforce development and training of local Native people to construct these energy

efficient homes, producing much needed jobs as well. RCR offers scholarships for students enrolling in their training programs as well as a lab environment for hands-on practice. It also incorporates Indigenous language, music, ceremony and culture in its training.
